





2.1 QUILTING THE PATCHWORK BODY





Key Method Legend (Patchwork & US Quilt Styling)

3.1 METHOD: PATCHWORK

Technique of sewing small fabric remnants together to form a larger design. Essential for a charming, cozy look.

3.2 METHOD: QUILTING (to Quilt)

Process of stitching through three layers (top, batting, backing) to hold them together and create relief and design. Adds texture.

3.3 STITCH-IN-THE-DITCH

Quilting seam placed directly on the seam lines of a pieced design to hide the thread while securing the layers.

3.4 1/4 INCH SEAM ALLOWANCE

The standard seam allowance in US quilting, crucial for accurate and consistent piecing.

3.5 BINDING (HAND-FINISHED)

Invisible hand-stitching to close openings or attach binding, achieving a flawless finish.

Required Materials & Preparation

Before diving into sewing, gather all your materials and prepare your pattern properly. Having everything ready will make your workflow smooth and enjoyable.

Materials You Will Need

- Denim fabric (various shades or patterns)
- Floral and polka dot cotton fabrics
- Red felt (for the comb and details)
- Yellow felt (for the beak)
- Fabric stuffing (polyfill)
- Sewing machine (or hand sewing tools)
- Thread (matching or contrasting)
- Bobbin and spool
- Split key ring
- Wooden bead (optional)
- Tassel (optional)
- Fabric scissors or rotary cutter
- Pins or clips
- Fabric marker or chalk

Pattern Preparation

Start by drawing or printing a rooster template. The pattern should include:

- Main body (cut 2 pieces)
- Wing patch pieces (multiple small shapes)
- Comb and tail (cut from felt)
- Beak (small triangle shape)

Cutting the Fabric

- Cut **2 main body pieces** from denim or base fabric
- Cut small patchwork pieces (floral, polka dots, denim)
- Cut comb and tail from red felt
- Cut beak from yellow felt

Make sure all pieces are cleanly cut and aligned with fabric grain when possible.

Quilting the Patchwork Body

This is where your rooster starts to come to life!

Creating the Patchwork Panel

- Arrange your small fabric pieces into a pleasing layout
- Mix patterns like polka dots and florals for contrast
- Keep balance in colors and shapes

Sewing the Patchwork

- Sew small pieces together using a **¼ inch seam allowance**
- Press seams flat after each step
- Continue until you have a panel large enough for the rooster body

Quilting the Fabric

- Place your patchwork top over batting (optional) and backing fabric
- Stitch through all layers using straight parallel lines
- This creates texture and durability

 Tip: Use evenly spaced lines for a clean “quilted” look or try a slightly wavy pattern for a handmade effect.

Cutting the Body Shape

- Place your rooster template over the quilted panel
- Trace and cut one body piece
- Cut the second body from plain denim or another fabric

Body & Comb Assembly

Now we assemble the main structure of your rooster.

Attaching the Comb and Tail

- Position the red felt comb at the top of the head
- Place the tail at the back
- Pin them between the two body layers (facing inward)

Adding the Wing

- Sew or topstitch the wing patch onto the front body piece
- Use a neat stitch close to the edge

Stitching the Body

- Place both body pieces **right sides together**
- Sew around the edge using a **¼ inch seam allowance**
- Leave a small opening at the bottom for turning

Reinforcing the Shape

- Clip curves carefully (do not cut the seam)
- This helps the fabric lay smoothly when turned

Turning & Stuffing the Rooster

This step transforms your flat piece into a 3D shape.

Turning the Fabric

- Turn the rooster right-side-out through the opening
- Use a blunt tool (like a pencil) to push out corners gently

Stuffing the Body

- Fill the rooster with stuffing evenly
- Do not overfill—keep it soft but shaped

Closing the Opening

- Fold the raw edges inward
- Stitch closed using:
 - Ladder stitch (invisible)
 - Or a neat topstitch

Adding Final Details

This is where personality shines!

Adding the Beak

- Sew or glue the yellow felt beak in place
- Position it neatly between the head layers

Eyes

You have two options:

- Safety eyes (insert before stuffing)
- Embroider eyes using black thread

Decorative Touches

- Attach a wooden bead at the bottom
- Add a tassel for extra charm

These details give your rooster a polished, handmade look.

Keychain Assembly

Let's turn your rooster into a functional keychain!

Adding the Loop

- Sew a small fabric loop or ribbon at the top
- Reinforce with extra stitches

Attaching the Split Ring

- Insert the loop through the key ring
- Ensure it is tightly secured

Final Check

- Tug gently to test durability
- Trim any loose threads

Understanding Key Quilting Techniques

Patchwork

Sewing small fabric pieces together to create a larger design. This is the core of your rooster's body.

Quilting

Stitch-in-the-Ditch

¼ Inch Seam Allowance

Binding (Optional Concept)

Though not used directly in this project, binding refers to finishing edges cleanly—useful for future quilting projects.
