

Crochet Cat Face Earrings – Complete Step-by-Step Tutorial



These **Crochet Cat Face Earrings** are charming, lightweight accessories made from small circular crochet motifs shaped with two pointed ears. After crocheting the base, the eyes, nose, and whiskers are embroidered with black thread, creating an adorable cat expression. A metal earring post is then attached to the back of each piece.

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This tutorial uses **US crochet terminology** and follows the construction shown in the graphic. The project is suitable for confident beginners who already know how to work in rounds. Because the pieces are small, they are also excellent for using leftover cotton yarn.

The finished size will depend on your yarn, hook, and tension. With worsted-weight cotton yarn and a 2.5 mm hook, each cat face should measure approximately **1.75–2 inches wide**, including the ears.

Materials and Supplies

To make one matching pair of earrings, gather the following materials:

- Worsted-weight cotton yarn in cream, white, gray, or another preferred color
- A small amount of black embroidery thread
- 2.5 mm crochet hook, approximately a US C hook
- Yarn needle
- Embroidery needle
- Small sharp scissors
- Two earring posts with decorative balls
- Two flat earring backs or findings suitable for gluing
- Fabric glue or jewelry adhesive
- Stitch marker, optional
- Blocking mat and pins, optional

Choose a cotton yarn with good stitch definition. Cotton is especially suitable because it creates a firm motif that holds its shape without becoming too heavy.

Avoid very fuzzy yarn because the embroidered facial details may disappear between the fibers. A smooth yarn allows the eyes, nose, and whiskers to remain clear.

For the most consistent results, make both crochet pieces before embroidering either face. This allows you to compare their size, ear placement, and overall shape.

US Crochet Abbreviations

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The following abbreviations are used throughout the pattern:

MR – Magic Ring: An adjustable loop used to begin crocheting in the round.

ch – Chain: Yarn over and pull the yarn through the loop on the hook.

sc – Single Crochet: Insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over again, and pull through both loops.

hdc – Half Double Crochet: Yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, and pull through all three loops.

dc – Double Crochet: Yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over and pull through two loops, then yarn over and pull through the remaining two loops.

sl st – Slip Stitch: Insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull through the stitch and the loop on the hook.

st/sts – Stitch/Stitches

inc – Increase: Work two stitches into the same stitch.

sk – Skip: Leave the indicated stitch unworked.

rep – Repeat: Repeat the instructions between the specified points.

Numbers shown inside brackets indicate the approximate stitch count at the end of the round.

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Step 1: Make the Magic Ring

Begin by leaving a yarn tail approximately 6 inches long. Wrap the yarn around your fingers to create an adjustable loop.

Insert the crochet hook into the loop, yarn over, and pull the yarn through. Chain one to secure the ring. This securing chain does not count as a stitch.

The center loop should remain open while you work the first round. Do not tighten it until all six single crochet stitches have been completed.

A magic ring creates a neat, nearly invisible center. This is especially important for earrings because the front of the motif will be clearly visible.

When making the second earring, try to leave the same amount of tension in the magic ring so both centers look alike.

MATERIALS

- Worsted weight cotton yarn in cream (or your choice)
- Small amount of black embroidery thread
- 2.5 mm (US C) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Earring posts with ball (gold or silver)
- Fabric glue (optional)

MR – Magic Ring
 ch – Chain
 sc – Single Crochet
 hdc – Half Double Crochet

1. CROCHET THE CAT FACE



Make a Magic Ring (MR).



Round 1: Ch 1, 6 sc in MR. (6 sts) Pull tail to close ring.



Round 2: 2 sc in each st around. (12 sts)



Round 3: *1 sc, 2 sc in next st* around. (18 sts)



Round 4: *2 sc, 2 sc in next st* around. (24 sts)



Round 5: sc in each st around. (24 sts)

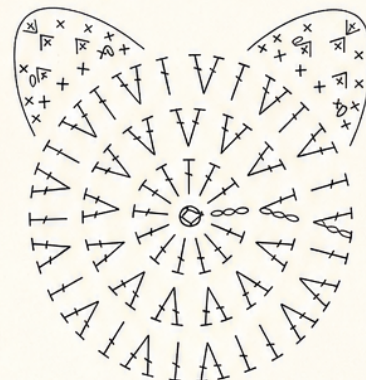


Round 6 (Ear 1): sc in next 7 sts, ch 3, skip 2 sts, sl st in next st (ear tip), ch 3, skip 2 sts, sc in last 7 sts. (20 sts + 2 ch-3 spaces)



Round 7: sc in each st and work 3 sc in each ch-3 space (this forms the ears). (26 sts)

2. EMBROIDER THE FACE

Use black embroidery thread and a yarn needle.



1. Eyes: With black thread, embroider two curved lines for the closed eyes.



2. Nose: Stitch a small triangle or upside-down heart in the center.



3. Whiskers: Add 3 straight lines on each side of the nose.

3. FINISH THE EARRING



1. Attach earring post to the back with fabric glue.



2. Press gently and let it dry completely.



3. Your cute cat face earring is ready!

TIPS

- Use tight, even stitches for a smooth finish.
- You can block lightly if needed.
- Change yarn colors for different cat styles!

MAIN CROCHET STITCHES (US)



Magic Ring (MR)



Chain (ch)



Single Crochet (sc)



Half Double Crochet (hdc)



Double Crochet (dc)

Slip Stitch (sl st)

Step 2: Crochet Round 1

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Round 1: Ch 1, work 6 sc into the MR. Pull the yarn tail firmly to close the center. Join with a sl st to the first sc. [6 sts]

After securing the magic ring, insert the hook back into the center and work six single crochet stitches around the loop.

Count each single crochet carefully. The chain made at the beginning is only for height and is not included in the stitch count.

Once the six stitches are complete, hold the motif with one hand and gently pull the starting yarn tail with the other. The center should close tightly.

Join the round by inserting the hook into the first single crochet and making a slip stitch.

At this stage, the piece will be very small. The stitches may feel crowded, so use the tip of the hook to locate the first stitch.

Step 3: Crochet Round 2

Round 2: Ch 1, work 2 sc in each st around. Join with a sl st. [12 sts]

Chain one to begin the new round. Work two single crochet stitches into the first stitch.

Continue placing two single crochet stitches into every stitch from the previous round. This doubles the stitch count from six to twelve.

These increases allow the motif to expand into a flat circle rather than forming a cup.

Count the stitches after completing the round. You should have twelve single crochet stitches, excluding the beginning chain.

Join to the first single crochet with a slip stitch. Keep the join fairly loose so it will be easy to insert the hook into that area during the next round.

Step 4: Crochet Round 3

Round 3: Ch 1, repeat 1 sc in the next st, 2 sc in the next st around. Join with a sl st. [18 sts]

Chain one. Work one single crochet into the first stitch, followed by two single crochet stitches into the next stitch.

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Continue repeating this sequence around the motif:

1 sc in the next st, 2 sc in the next st.

This round contains an increase in every second stitch. The stitch count will grow from twelve to eighteen.

Spread the increases evenly. If several increases are accidentally placed close together, one side of the circle may become wavy.

Join with a slip stitch and count eighteen stitches before continuing.

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Step 5: Crochet Round 4

Round 4: Ch 1, repeat 2 sc in the next st, 1 sc in each of the next 2 sts around. Join with a sl st. [24 sts]

Chain one. Work two single crochet stitches into the first stitch to create an increase.

Work one single crochet in each of the next two stitches.

Repeat the sequence around:

2 sc in the next st, 1 sc in each of the next 2 sts.

This evenly adds six stitches, bringing the round to twenty-four stitches.

The circle should lie reasonably flat. A slight curve is acceptable because the motif can be gently blocked later.

Join to the first single crochet with a slip stitch.

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Step 6: Crochet Round 5

Round 5: Ch 1, work 1 sc in each st around. Join with a sl st. [24 sts]

This is a non-increase round. Chain one and work one single crochet in each of the twenty-four stitches.

Do not add any increases during this round. The purpose of Round 5 is to strengthen the outer area and give the cat face a more defined edge.

Check your stitch count as you work. Accidentally adding or skipping a stitch can change the position of the ears in the next round.

When all twenty-four stitches are complete, join with a slip stitch.

The piece should now resemble a small, firm crochet circle.

Step 7: Form the First Cat Ear

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Round 6 changes the circular motif into a cat-shaped face. The ears are created with chain spaces and taller stitches.

Round 6: Ch 1, sc in the next 7 sts.

Work slowly and count seven single crochet stitches from the beginning of the round.

Now make the first ear:

Ch 3, skip 2 sts, sl st in the next st.

The three chains form a small pointed loop. Skipping two stitches creates enough room for the ear to stand above the circular edge.

To secure the ear, make a slip stitch into the next indicated stitch.

Do not pull the chains too tightly. They should be firm but flexible enough to accept stitches in the following round.

Step 8: Form the Second Cat Ear

After completing the first ear, continue across the top of the cat face.

Work 1 sc in each of the next 7 sts.

Count carefully so the ears remain balanced on opposite sides of the top edge.

Create the second ear in the same way:

Ch 3, skip 2 sts, sl st in the next st.

Depending on where your round began and how tightly you crochet, you may have a small number of stitches remaining before reaching the beginning.

Continue according to the placement shown in the graphic, keeping both ear loops evenly positioned. Join the round neatly.

The stitch placement is more important than forcing an exact count when shaping the ears. Both ear loops should be approximately the same height and distance from the center.

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Step 9: Crochet the Final Edging and Define the Ears

Round 7: Ch 1, sc in each regular stitch until you reach the first chain-3 ear space.

Work one single crochet into each stitch along the lower edge of the face.

When you reach the first chain-3 space, work:

3 sc into the chain-3 space.

The three single crochet stitches build the pointed ear and make it more substantial.

Continue with one single crochet in each stitch between the ears. When you reach the second chain-3 space, work three single crochet stitches into it.

Finish by working one single crochet in each remaining stitch. Join with a slip stitch.

The graphic indicates approximately **26 stitches** after the final shaping round. Small differences may occur depending on where the slip stitches and joins were placed. The two earrings should match each other in size and ear placement.

Fasten off, leaving a yarn tail approximately 5 inches long.

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Step 10: Weave in the Yarn Ends

Thread the ending yarn tail through a yarn needle.

Pass the needle under several stitches on the back of the motif. Change direction and pass it under another group of stitches to secure it.

Trim the excess yarn close to the fabric without cutting the crochet stitches.

Repeat the process with the starting tail at the center. Make sure the magic ring remains completely closed before trimming the tail.

Check the front of the motif. The center and final join should look neat, and no loose ends should be visible.

Complete the second cat face using the same pattern.

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Step 11: Compare and Shape Both Cat Faces

Place the two crochet motifs side by side.

Check that the circles are approximately the same width and that the ears are similar in height and placement.

Gently stretch or massage the crochet fabric with your fingers to improve the shape. Do not pull hard, as this may distort the stitches.

The lower portion should remain round while the top should have two clearly defined points.

If one ear looks slightly smaller, use the yarn needle to adjust the surrounding stitches before embroidering the face.

For a more polished finish, the pieces may be lightly blocked.

Step 12: Lightly Block the Crochet Pieces

Blocking is optional but helpful when the motifs curl or do not lie completely flat.

Lightly mist each piece with clean water. The crochet should be damp, not soaked.

Place the pieces on a blocking mat or folded towel. Shape the lower edge into a circle and gently pull each ear into a neat point.

Secure the pieces with rust-resistant pins if necessary.

Allow them to dry completely before adding embroidery or glue. Attaching the earring hardware to damp yarn may prevent the adhesive from bonding properly.

Step 13: Plan the Embroidered Face

Before inserting the embroidery needle, study the center of each crochet piece.

The nose should sit close to the center of the circle. The eyes should be placed slightly above the nose, and the whiskers should extend outward from both sides.

Use the crochet rounds as placement guides. Count the visible stitch spaces to help position both faces evenly.

The expression in the graphic uses two curved closed eyes, a small dark nose, and three whiskers on each side.

You may place small removable markers where the eyes and nose will be embroidered before making permanent stitches.

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Step 14: Embroider the Closed Eyes

Thread an embroidery needle with black embroidery thread. A length of approximately 12–16 inches is usually sufficient.

Insert the needle from the back of the crochet piece so the knot remains hidden.

Create the first eye with two or three small diagonal stitches arranged in a gentle upward curve. The curve should resemble a happy closed eye.

Move to the opposite side and embroider the second eye using the same number of stitches.

Try to keep both eyes equal in width and height. Step back occasionally and compare them before securing the thread.

Do not pull the embroidery thread too tightly, as this can pucker the crochet fabric.

Step 15: Embroider the Cat Nose

Bring the black thread up near the center of the face.

Create a small filled triangle, oval, or upside-down heart. The sample shows a compact dark nose with a soft triangular shape.

Begin with one horizontal stitch to establish the width.

Add several short stitches beneath it, gradually shortening them to form a point.

Pass the thread through the same areas carefully so the nose looks solid rather than bulky.

Secure the thread temporarily on the back, but do not cut it yet if enough remains for the whiskers.

Step 16: Embroider the Whiskers

The graphic shows three straight whisker lines on each side of the nose.

Bring the needle up beside the nose and make one long straight stitch toward the outside edge of the face.

Create two additional stitches, placing one slightly above and one slightly below the first line.

Repeat the same process on the opposite side.

The whiskers do not need to be perfectly identical, but they should have similar lengths and spacing.

Keep them away from the outermost edge so the embroidery thread will not slip around the crochet stitches.

Step 17: Secure the Embroidery Thread

Turn the cat face over carefully.

Pass the embroidery needle beneath several crochet loops on the back. Make a small securing knot if desired.

Run the thread under another group of stitches in the opposite direction.

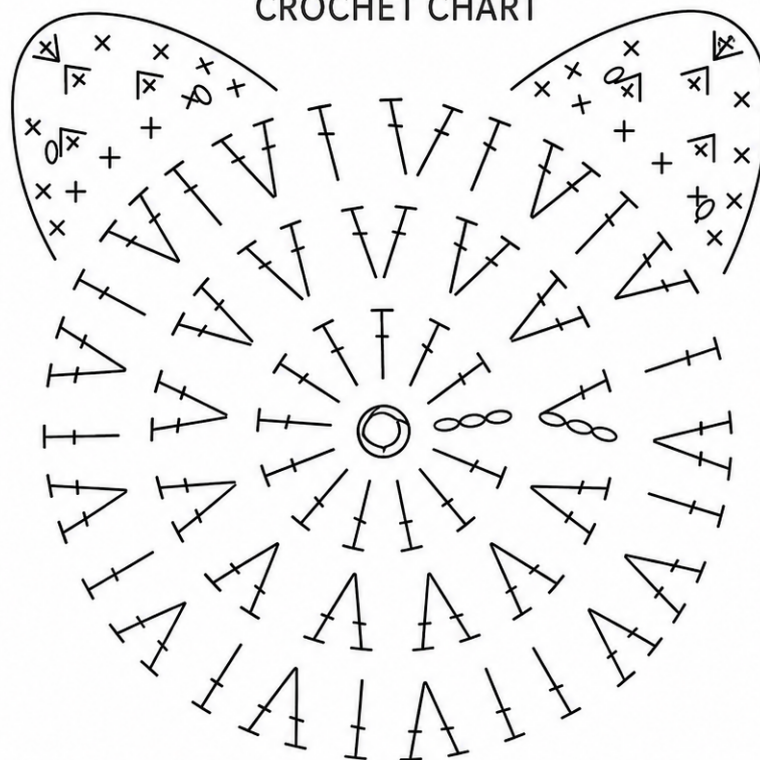
Trim the thread close to the crochet surface.

Check the front and gently adjust any embroidered stitches that appear loose.

Repeat the complete embroidery process on the second cat face, using the first piece as a placement guide.

Step 18: Prepare the Earring Posts

Use earring posts that have a flat glue pad on the back. The gold ball posts shown in the graphic give the earrings a polished jewelry-style finish, but silver findings may also be used.

Before applying glue, determine where the post will sit.

The post should be attached near the upper center of the back, between the two ears. The decorative ball and connecting loop should remain visible above the crochet piece.

Place both earrings side by side with the fronts facing down. Mark the same attachment position on each piece.

Read the adhesive manufacturer's instructions before use. Work in a ventilated area when using jewelry adhesive.

Step 19: Attach the Earring Hardware

Apply a small amount of fabric glue or suitable jewelry adhesive to the flat pad of the first earring post.

Do not use excessive glue. Too much adhesive may soak through the crochet stitches and become visible on the front.

Press the glued pad firmly against the back of the cat face.

Hold it in place for the amount of time recommended by the adhesive manufacturer.

Repeat with the second earring, checking that both posts are positioned at the same height and angle.

Leave the earrings lying flat with the fronts facing down while the glue begins to set.

Step 20: Allow the Glue to Dry Completely

Do not wear or move the earrings immediately after attaching the posts.

Allow the adhesive to dry according to the product instructions. Some fabric glues may feel dry within a short time but require several hours to cure fully.

Keep the pieces on a clean, flat surface while drying.

Avoid bending the crochet motif near the attachment area.

Once the glue is completely cured, gently test each post by holding the crochet piece and lightly moving the hardware. It should remain securely attached.

Step 21: Final Inspection and Finishing

Place the finished earrings next to each other with the cat faces upright.

Check the shape, facial placement, post position, and overall size.

Trim any tiny yarn fibers or embroidery tails that remain visible.

Gently straighten the ears and whiskers with your fingers.

Attach the earring backs to the posts so the pair can be safely stored.

Your handmade **Crochet Cat Face Earrings** are now complete.

Main Crochet Stitch Guide

Magic Ring: Wrap the yarn into a loop, insert the hook, pull up a loop, and chain one. Work the first-round stitches into the adjustable loop, then pull the tail to close the center.

Chain: Yarn over and pull the yarn through the loop already on the hook. Chains create height, connecting sections, and the foundations for the ears.

Single Crochet: Insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over again and pull through both loops.

Half Double Crochet: Yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over once more and pull through all three loops. Although included in the chart legend, the main written construction primarily uses single crochet.

Double Crochet: Yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through two loops twice. This taller stitch may be used to create a more pronounced ear variation.

Slip Stitch: Insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull the yarn directly through the stitch and the loop on the hook. Slip stitches are used to join rounds and secure the ear chains.

Helpful Tips for Matching Earrings

Maintain even tension throughout both motifs. Small projects make differences in tension more visible, so avoid making one piece immediately after very tight or very loose crochet work.

Count every round. Missing a single increase can make one earring smaller or cause the circle to curve.

Use the same hook, yarn, and embroidery thread for both pieces.

Make both crochet bases before embroidering the faces. It is easier to match the facial placement when both blank motifs are available.

Use small amounts of glue and allow the pieces to dry fully.

For different cat styles, try gray, black, orange, brown, or variegated yarn. Embroidered stripes or small patches can also be added.

Optional Design Variations

For a tabby cat, embroider two or three short lines between the ears.

For a calico-inspired design, sew small irregular patches using brown, black, and orange embroidery thread.

To make open eyes, embroider two small vertical or oval shapes instead of curved lines.

A tiny mouth can be added beneath the nose with two short diagonal stitches.

For added decoration, attach a miniature crochet flower, bow, or bead near one ear. Keep embellishments lightweight so the earrings remain comfortable.

To make smaller earrings, use crochet thread with a 1.5–2 mm hook. To create larger ornaments or keychains, use thicker yarn and a larger hook.

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Care Instructions

Store the earrings in a dry container away from direct sunlight.

Avoid exposing the crochet and adhesive to water, perfume, hairspray, or cosmetic products.

Clean the surface gently with a dry, soft cloth. Do not place the earrings in a washing machine.

If the motifs become slightly bent during storage, reshape them with your fingers or lightly block them again while protecting the metal hardware from moisture.

Inspect the glued posts occasionally. If a post begins to loosen, remove old adhesive residue and reattach it with a suitable jewelry glue.
